MESSAGE FOR NOVEMBER

One of World War I's most poignant memorials is that of Edith Cavell outside London's National Portrait Gallery. The statue of Cavell in her nurse's uniform stands 10 feet high, and is placed on a grey granite pylon which weighs 175 tonnes.

On various sides, the granite block bears the inscriptions "Humanity, For King and Country, Devotion, Fortitude, Sacrifice and Faithful until death". On the pedestal beneath the words are: "Patriotism is not enough. I must have no hatred or bitterness for anyone." The last inscription are her words to Reverend Stirling Gahan, an Anglican chaplain who was permitted to give her Holy Communion on the night before her execution.

Prior to 1914, this British nurse served as the matron to a training hospital in Brussels. After the outbreak of war, she chose to remain in occupied Belgium, tending to German & British soldiers alike. In August 1915, she was accused of helping two hundred British and French prisoners-of-war to escape to neutral Holland.

During her trial, Cavell admitted that she was guilty and was sentenced to death. The night before her execution on October 12, 1915, Cavell confided to the chaplain, "This I would say, standing as I do in view of God and eternity, I realise that patriotism is not enough. I must have no hatred or bitterness towards anyone."

Although her execution was legal under international law, it caused outrage in Britain and in many neutral countries. She became a symbol of the Allied cause, and her memory was invoked in recruitment posters and messages in Britain and around the world.

Opinion has varied as to how best to remember this devout Christian lady. In 1940, Hitler ordered the Edith Cavell memorial in Paris to be destroyed. In Canada they named a glacier and mountain in her honour. Today, the Cavell Nurses' Trust supports thousands of registered nurses, midwives and healthcare assistants.

Was she foolish to remain in occupied Belgium when she could have returned to England? Was her death appropriately used by the British Army recruitment authorities? Was a German soldier shot alongside her for refusing to take part in the firing squad?

Many questions to ponder, but I suggest that by remembering her life and death, the greatest challenge she poses to us today, is how we too can behave humanely without hatred or bitterness towards anyone.



HYMN: THE STORY BEHIND 'TO GOD BE THE GLORY!'

Fanny Crosby (1820 - 1915), the American singer and musician, was blind from the age of six weeks. She married her music teacher, Alexander Van Alstyne, who was also blind.

She was a prolific song-writer, and once signed a contract with a publisher to write three songs every week throughout the year. But in fact, she wrote thousands during her lifetime.

Although American evangelists Moody and Sankey used this hymn on their missions, it did not become an immediate favourite. But after Billy Graham featured it in his Harringay crusade in 1954, Londoners were soon singing it on their way home, in streets and busy queues and underground trains.

When Dr Graham took it back to the United States and introduced it at his crusade in Nashville, Tennessee, it soon took its place in the group of top favourite hymns.

To God be the glory, great things He hath done, So loved He the world that He gave us His Son, Who yielded His life our redemption to win, And opened the life-gate that all may go in.

Praise the Lord, praise the Lord,
Let the earth hear His voice;
Praise the Lord, praise the Lord,
Let the people rejoice;
Oh, come to the Father, through Jesus the Son,
And give Him the glory; great things He hath done.

Oh, perfect redemption, the purchase of blood, To every believer the promise of God; The vilest offender who truly believes, That moment from Jesus a pardon receives.

Great things He hath taught us, great things He hath done, And great our rejoicing through Jesus the Son; But purer, and higher, and greater will be Our wonder, our transport when Jesus we see.

KEEP A CLOSE EYE ON YOUR PHONE AND BAG

It is something we all dread on holiday – that someone will rush by us, grabbing our phone or bag on the way.



But now it is time to beware of thieves at home, as robberies here have recently hit a 10-year high. More than 200 people a day are falling victim to phone or bag snatch thefts in England and Wales. That is double the rate of even last year.

Police say that the dramatic increase in snatching phones is fuelled by the money that can be made in repurposing and selling them in the UK and overseas.

The problem has prompted government action. Diana Johnson, the policing minister, is calling on tech and phone firms to ensure that any stolen phones can be quickly, easily and permanently disabled. That would

prevent them from ever being re-registered for sale on the second-hand market.

Mobile phones may be modern, but sadly thieves and danger are as old as history: 'Destructive forces are at work in the city; threats and lies never leave its streets.' (Ps 55:11)

THE REMARKABLE USEFULNESS OF ALLEN KEYS

We all need practical skills, and they are not always easily gained.

All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work. 2 Timothy 3:16-17

I seem to spend a lot of time assembling flat pack furniture of one type or another. The trick is to look and sound as though you know what you are doing, even though any skills are gained through trial and error. It is surprising how many household projects require an Allen key, which if you have not seen one, is an L shaped rod with a hexagon end which fits into an identical sized recess in the top of a screw. You can use the longer or shorter arm depending on the job needs

The idea of a hexagon *socket* screw was probably thought of as early as the 1860s to 1890s, but such screws were not widely manufactured until around 1910. In 1909–1910, William G. Allen also patented a method of screw heads which had a *hexagonal* recessed die. The key that he lent his name to fits nicely into the head of the screw, is cheap and easy to use.

When you are called on to do some DIY, especially after someone has had a go, the best thing is to refer to the instructions and keep all your Allen keys together in one place so you can easily find them. They come in different sizes.

BONFIRE NIGHT – THE FIREWORK CODE TO KEEP YOUR FAMILY SAFE

Here are some tips from the police, to help families stay safe while they are having Bonfire Night fun...

- Only buy fireworks that are CE marked. Respect them they travel at speeds of about 80 mph.
- Don't drink alcohol if setting off fireworks.
- Keep fireworks in a closed box.
- Follow the instructions on each firework.
- Light them at arm's length, using a taper.
- Stand well back.
- Never go near a firework that has been lit. Even if it hasn't gone off, it could still explode.
- Never put fireworks in your pocket or throw them. Throwing a firework is a criminal offence – you can be fined up to £5,000.
- Always supervise children around fireworks.
- Light sparklers one at a time and wear gloves.
- Never give sparklers to a child under five. Sparklers burn at temperatures of about 2000 degrees. If three sparklers burn together, they will do so at the same heat as a blowtorch.
- Keep pets indoors.
- Don't set off noisy fireworks late at night and never after 11pm.

THE WAR OF THE CAFÉS AND THE LAPTOPS

How do you regard your local café? As a place to meet your friends and catch up on the local news? Or as your office, where you do emails, hold Zoom meetings and work for hours – all for the price of a cappuccino?

It seems that across the country, local cafés are being invaded by laptop holding freeloaders who want to use their premises as free office space.

One café owner tells the story of a project manager who spends his morning in her café holding Zoom meetings in a very loud voice, and then paces the length of her café to discuss weekly sales targets on the phone, oblivious of other customers. "He is really focused on his meetings – he got furious when I finally said something."

Another café owner tells of several laptop workers who move into her café for the entire day, taking up tables for hours and hours, all for the price of one cup of coffee. "But we are a small independent business, so we need to keep those tables busy and turned around!"

Still another has been told to keep her café quiet during the laptop users' Zoom meetings, and even to stop other customers from talking at all.

The café owners are united in saying that they welcome laptop workers as long as they spend money appropriate to the time they spend at the tables, and who do not stay for more than two hours. "Otherwise, there is no warm, bustling atmosphere. The place becomes silent like an office, with people intent over their computers. It is the kiss of death to our business."



ALL IN THE MONTH OF NOVEMBER

It was:

250 years ago, on 22 Nov 1774 that Robert Clive, 1st Baron Clive (Clive of India), died. He was the British general who helped found the British Empire in India.

150 years ago, on 23rd Nov 1874 that Thomas Hardy's novel Far from the Madding Crowd was published. It was his first major success.

125 years ago, from 2nd Nov 1899 to 28 Feb 1900 that the Siege of Ladysmith, a British Colony of Natal, took place. The Boers surrounded the town and cut off the rail link, starving the British defenders. A relief party, which included future British Prime Minister Winston Churchill, arrived on 28th Feb. British victory.

100 years ago, on 2nd Nov 1924 that the first crossword puzzle to appear in a British newspaper was published in the Sunday Express.

90 years ago, on 30th Nov 1934 that the British steam locomotive, *Flying Scotsman*, became the first train officially to reach 100 mph.

80 years ago, on 12th Nov 1944 that the British RAF bombed and sank the German battleship Tirpitz, sister ship of the Bizmark, off Norway.

70 years ago, on 13^{th} Nov 1954 that the first Rugby League World Cup Final was held, in Paris, France. Great Britain beat France 16 - 12.

65 years ago, on 1st Nov 1959 that the first stretch of the M1 motorway opened in Britain. Britain's first motorway service station also opened at Watford Gap.

60 years ago, on 23rd Nov 1964 that the Second Vatican Council allowed the use of vernacular languages (such as English) in Roman Catholic sacraments and rituals, including the Mass.

50 years ago, on 8th Nov 1974 that British aristocrat Lord Lucan disappeared from his home in London after his children's nanny was bludgeoned to death and his wife was attacked. There were hundreds of claims of sightings around the world in the following years, but none were substantiated. He was never found and is presumed dead.

Also 50 years ago, on 20th Nov 1974 that British politician John Stonehouse faked his death by leaving a pile of clothing on a beach in Miami, Florida. He was found alive and well in Australia on 24th Dec, and was arrested on suspicion of being Lord Lucan.

Also 50 years ago, on 25th Nov 1974 that South African heart surgeon Dr Christian Barnard performed the world's first double heart transplant. The original heart was left in place and a donor heart was connected to it to support its workload.

40 years ago, on 25th Nov 1984 that 36 musicians gathered in London to record the Band Aid single *Do They Know It's Christmas* to raise money for famine relief in Ethiopia. 30 years ago, on 14th Nov 1994 that the first fare-paying passengers travelled through the Channel Tunnel linking England and France.

Also 30 years ago, on 19th Nov 1994 that Britain's first National Lottery draw was held. 25 years ago, on 29th Nov 1999 that the Northern Ireland Assembly appointed its first power sharing executive committee.

15 years ago, on 26th Nov 2009 that the Murphy Commission of Inquiry published its damning report on the abuse of children by Roman Catholic priests in Dublin during 1975 - 2004. It was found that church leaders had conspired with the Garda to cover up the abuse. 10 years ago, on 3rd Nov 2014 that the One World Trade Center officially opened in New York City. It replaced the World Trade Center that was destroyed in the 9/11 terrorist attacks in 2001.

Alex Ledger reached 530 senior club appearances with Craig Fellows close behind on 527. Matthew Smith reached 7,000 runs, Liam Kelly and Luke Brooksby both reached 5,000 and Matthew Sewell and Asif Ali 3,000 runs. CHILD CRIMINALS ON THE INCREASE

The number of children caught committing crimes has risen by nine per cent in just the past year.

Altogether, the number of under-18s who have been arrested for all crimes has risen by 16 per cent since the beginning of the pandemic in 2020. It now stands at nearly 60,000.

Crimes of violence, robbery and knife possession all feature highly. Under-18s now account for nearly four in 10 of all robbery arrests where they have used force to steal from a person or a place.

Government-backed agencies are linking the increase of these crimes to the effects of lockdown, when children were left isolated at home, without the support of their teachers, social networks and sports activities.

Simon Harding, a professor of criminology at St Mary's University, London, said: "There are many cases of children attacking or killing other children and using weapons that were once considered extreme outside of a Hollywood or gangster movie, but which are now becoming commonplace."

Weapon possession among the young is also soaring since the pandemic. Children account for nearly one in five (18.4 per cent) of all arrests for weapon possession. Almost one in 20 (4.6 per cent) of knife assaults leading to hospital treatment involved children aged under 16. Research by the Ben Kinsella Trust found that one in 20 children aged 12 or over have carried a knife.

A KEY TO LONGER LIFE? KEEP CALM AND CARRY ON

Scientists have long known that mental resilience, or our ability to bounce back in the face of trouble and adversity, has a powerful effect on us for the good. Such resilience has been linked to preventing disease, keeping chronic illnesses at bay, and helping us recover after trauma.

Now it seems that our capacity to cope with and adapt to challenging life events may even delay our risk of dying for a good few years.

Scientists at the University of Sun Yat-sen, in Shenzhen China, have done extensive research into the health records of more than 10,000 Americans who had signed up for the US Health and Retirement Study. They found that those who scored high on qualities such as perseverance, calmness, a sense of purpose, self-reliance and stoicism had a much lower death rate than others who scored lower.

Writing in the journal BMJ Mental Health, the authors said: "Exposure to adversity, such as poverty or significant life events like job loss or bereavement, often leads to disruptions in psychological functioning. However, individuals differ in their ability to overcome and adapt to adversity, with some exhibiting resilience while others struggle."

The Bible urges us to not try and cope with life on our own. Instead, it reminds us that God is always our refuge, 'a very present help in trouble'.

Psalm 55 says: 'Cast your burden upon the LORD and He will sustain you; He will never allow the righteous to be shaken.' Now that sounds like resilience - with some heavenly back-up!

REFLECTING FAITH: WALL PAINTINGS

Prior to the Reformation, English churches were highly decorated with interior wall paintings. As one author wrote, 'They were aglow with colour and images covering every flat surface'.

Painting pictures seems to be a basic part of people. We see that in newly discovered caves where people from the distant past have made sketches and created art works.

Pictures are more than just communicating a 'flat' story.

Just as we all have our preferred ways of learning – listening, watching, reading, practising – so I suspect we also have for explaining. How much more so, then, when we want to get across really important information; and it doesn't get much more serious than telling others about God.

Of course, we know the Early Church, at the very beginning, followed the Jewish tradition of not drawing a likeness of God and hence they used signs and symbols. But that didn't stop them from drawing pictures about everything else: stories from the Bible, lives of the saints, and so on. There was no shortage of pictures to be drawn.

There are not many English churches which still have wall paintings, but if you visit an Orthodox church in the UK or if you get the opportunity to enter one when on the Continent, you will see that every inch (centimetre) of the inside plaster is likely to be covered in wall paintings. Quite literally, painting on the wall!

Today, instead of painting on the wall in the UK, we seem to be increasing the number of banners that hang on them, and changing them often, to match the church calendar.

SOMETHING FOR NIGHT OWLS TO CONSIDER

If you are a night owl, then this is not good news: recent research has found that those of us who prefer a late bedtime also tend to have a higher body mass index (BMI), larger waists and be almost 50 per cent more likely to develop Type 2 diabetes.

Previous studies that found a link between late nights and Type 2 diabetes put the blame on unhealthy habits such as eating junk food. But now scientists in the Netherlands say that it may be the late nights themselves which are the problem.

Lead researcher Dr Jeroen van der Velde, of Leiden University Medical Centre, in the Netherlands, explained: "A likely explanation is that the circadian rhythm or body clock in late chronotypes is out of sync with the work and social schedules followed by society. This can lead to circadian misalignment, which we know can lead to metabolic disturbances and ultimately Type 2 diabetes."

A solution? The scientists suggested that night owls might benefit from either going to bed earlier, or in having their last meal of the day earlier.

On the other hand, the Psalmist made the most of being awake in the night, for he wrote: 'On my bed I remember You; I think of You through the watches of the night.' (Ps 63.6) Also, 'I will praise the Lord, who counsels me; even at night my heart instructs me.' (Ps 16.7)
